NEFLHCC General Membership Meeting



Achieve a health and medical sustem that is efficient and resilient in an emergency.

The general membership meeting and Executive Board meeting of the Northeast Florida Healthcare Coalition was held on Wednesday, February 17, at noon. The meeting took place at the offices of the Northeast Florida Regional Council and held immediately following the COOP Training for Healthcare Agencies session. The meeting was well attended and included representation from several agencies that had not participated before. One of the key items for discussion included the upcoming training and exercise events. The Ebola Summit will be held on April 12, 2016 at the Lexington Hotel in downtown Jacksonville. Additionally, the annual exercise will be held on April 27, 2016 at the Mayo Clinic. This will be a tabletop exercise and will focus on special needs clients during an evacuation.

Nancy Freeman reviewed criteria to be used in the update to the Coalition's Strategic Plan, including the overall mission statement and strategic objectives. This update will be finalized and approved at the March 16 Board Meeting. Chair Leigh Wilsey provided an update on Coalition funding and the issue of 'regionalization' of Coalitions across the State. For regions that have more than one Coalition, the money would be given to one entity and then the region would decide how to allocate funding across the coalitions. Currently, Region 3 is made up of the Northeast Florida HCC, the North Central HCC and the Marion County HCC (called CHAMP).

A strategy for regional oversight in the Region has been presented to each of these three Coalitions as well as the RDSTF Health and Medical Co-chair, Paul Meyers, and State FDOH. Regional Resiliency Evening Exchanges

The Northeast Florida Regional Council continues to host Regional Resiliency Evening Exchanges the last Monday of the month. These events provide an opportunity for those working on the action items of the Public/Private Regional Resiliency Committee of the Council to meet, work, and hold events. On February 29, the Building Resiliently Working Group held a brief strategy discussion to finalize the output and intended audience of their work products. Then the Incentivize Resilience group met to discuss ways to finance resilience. This was a follow up discussion from last month's information session on Community Redevelopment Regional Resiliency Evening Exchanges Agencies, tax increment financing and property assessed clean



energy (PACE) as potential mechanisms. The discussions, observations and advice will be summarized into a final report, intended to provide local governments with a starting point if they chose to tackle this issue. For more information, please contact Margo Moehring, mmoehring@nefrc.org

The Regional Resiliency Rebuild (R3) Challenge has Launched!

Public/Private Regional Resiliency Committee of the Council has launched the Regional Resiliency Rebuild design competition. The competition is asking for teams to think about how Northeast Florida could thrive after a disaster. This challenge is similar to Rebuild by Design, which launched after Superstorm Sandy. The R3 Challenge seeks to encourage consideration of regional vulnerabilities and to inspire creative ideas BEFORE the disaster happens. A base map is provided that reflects the areas that have been subject to a disaster. This map is then used for teams to imagine that the built and natural environments in these areas have been severely impacted by a storm, and that most buildings and infrastructure in these areas are no longer viable. This exact scenario will never happen, as storms do not follow the pathways set by the flood zones or storm surge zones included in our map. However, the map will help participants imagine a disaster before it happens, and this can make the Region better positioned to rebuild what is appropriate where it is appropriate, to rethink and to regroup after a disaster.
