

LEPC

Northeast Florida Local Emergency Planning Committee had a monumental year. The LEPC was recognized at the national level for the development and implementation of a full scale exercise with CSX. This was a public/



private partnership recognized and published in the nationally distributed periodical Transcaer magazine. This event included three phases that offered a variety of different trainings, ending with the final phase of a full scale exercise involving NE Florida's three hazmat teams and over 66 participants. Since the northeast LEPC covers the counties of Baker, Clay, Duval, Flagler, Nassau, & St. Johns this event was designed to incorporate teams from the whole region and is the reason this event was so successful, and could not have been done without the partnership of CSX.



Harthare Coefficiens

This year was a big year for the Northeast Florida Regional Council and Healthcare Coalitions in the State of Florida. In 2017, the NEFRC signed a five year contract to manage three healthcare coalitions in North Florida – Northeast Florida HCC, North Central Florida HCC and CHAMP in Marion County. NEFRC oversees budgets, subcontracts, contract deliverables and staffing. The diversity of the three coalitions includes:



18 counties, 28 hospitals, 6,000+ Acute Care Beds & 10,000+ Nursing Home Beds.

Specific to the Northeast Florida HCC, membership has doubled in 2017. Nearly \$150,000 in funding was awarded to members to advance disaster preparedness across the region. Successful training and exercises were implemented, including the First Annual Healthcare Partners Training Summit, which included over 120 participants and guest speaker and Pulitzer Prize winning author Sheri Fink.

They also crafted First Coast Vision, part of the NEFRC's guiding Strategic Regional Policy Plan.

Success: RCI collaborated with southern Georgia on water issues.

The Regional Community Institute is working on REGIONAL TOURISM in 2018.

Iransportation Disadvantaged

NEFRC staffs the Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Boards for Baker, Clay, Flagler, Nassau, Putnam and St. Johns Counties. These Boards are comprised of volunteers and agency representatives who advise on coordination of transit for the transportation disadvantaged. They assist the service providers in this very challenging field, helping them to address this very important need.

Success: Regional coordination of transit is a top priority for LCBs in Northeast Florida.

Over the last two years, five of the Transportation **Disadvantaged Service Plans overseen by NEFRC have** been significantly updated.

Affordable Housing Needs Pl

NEFRC's Board prepared to adopt a Regional Housing Needs Plan with three major goals and five broad strategies. The NEFRC invited the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation's Banker's Roundtable Meeting to be held at the Council's offices in June where regulators and banks discussed affordable housing opportunities for cooperation.

Success: The Affordable Housing Needs plan, a goal of the Strategic Regional Policy Plan, is on track for approval by the NEFRC Board in 2018.

P Program

The NEFRC is now partnering with St. Johns Housing Partnership to house qualified residents of Putnam County. St John's Housing Partnership manages the rehabilitation contracting and the NEFRC manages the planning tasks and provides staffing for the Local



Housing Advisory Committee. Success: The Putnam County Local Housing Advisory Committee completed a triennial review of the program.



Public/Private Regional The **Resiliency Committee continues** to provide leadership and action on sea level rise in Northeast Florida, and what the business

Success: P2R2 action item on Regional Evacuation Planning has become a NEFRC policy priority.

Success: P2R2 consists of volunteers with a business focus. There is no structure to the committee, as it operates by consensus. It works!

Technical Assistance

NEFRC is under contract with Pomona Park, Interlachen and Beverly Beach to provide assistance with planning and zoning issues as needed. Preliminary preparations were made for the local governments to adopt ordinances concerning the new requirement of a Water Supply Facilities Work Plan.

Success: The local governments were assisted with three rezonings and a road right of way dispute that was settled.

Comprenensive Pl

Every month, large scale (more than 10 acres) comprehensive plan amendments from any of the seven counties or their municipalities are reviewed by NEFRC Staff against two criteria as mandated by State law. Those criteria are adverse impacts to critical State resources, and extra-jurisdictional impacts that would be inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan of an affected local government.

Success: All reviews were conducted in the 30 day time period required by statute.

NEFRC considered twenty-one comprehensive plan amendments for eight local governments totaling 4,113.62 acres.

onomic Impact Analysis



NEFRC provides economic impact analysis modelling services for our economic development partners to assist in determining the level of public investment, if any, a local government will offer to secure an economic development opportunity.

Northeast Florida.

Success: NEFRC's analysis helped secure the Amazon distribution which will grow the Region's economy by \$2 Billion/year.

Elevate Northeast Florida

The NEFRC in partnership with JAXUSA and CareerSource was awarded a matching grant from the U.S. Economic Development Administration to update the region's 2011 economic development strategy called Innovate Northeast Florida. This new effort called Elevate Northeast Florida is scheduled to be completed in the fall of 2018.

Success: We have agreement that our **ComprehensiveEconomicDevelopment** Strategy will align with the results of **Elevate Northeast Florida**
