It has been an honor to serve as President of the Board of Directors of the Northeast Florida Regional Council (NEFRC) over the past year. Northeast Florida is a region where vibrant communities, rich history, and a thriving economy converge to create an exceptional environment for living, working, and visiting.

This year, the Council has continued to deliver on its mission: to strengthen and support the region and its member counties by engaging people, businesses, and organizations to address shared challenges and opportunities. We convene partners, provide trusted data analysis, and develop collaborative solutions that enhance resilience, safety, prosperity, and quality of life across Northeast Florida.

One of the most critical grants the NEFRC received this year targets the sustainment of one of Northeast Florida's key economic sectors – the military. The Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation within the Department of Defense awarded a grant for the completion of a Military Installation Readiness Review. This project identifies and prioritizes off-base infrastructure projects that enhance mission readiness and support the long-term sustainability of Northeast Florida military installations – Camp Blanding Joint Training Center, Naval Station Mayport, Naval Air Station Jacksonville and Marine Corps Support Facility Blount Island. This project is keeping with the Region's deep support for our installations, military personnel and their families and veterans who call Northeast Florida home.

Our Resilience Program has had a busy year. Through funding from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Resilient Florida Program and federal grants, we advanced key resilience planning projects, including Vulnerability Assessments, management of the Resilient First Coast Collaborative, and the Regional Resiliency Action Plan

We also strengthened our partnership with the National Park Service to expand and enhance our regional trail network, supporting eco-tourism and improving recreational access across the region, with a focus on the St. Mary's River.

Beyond resilience, the Council launched its official Community Visioning Program, helping the small municipalities in the Region engage their residents to create shared roadmaps for future growth and economic prosperity. Our Transportation Disadvantaged Program continued to provide essential mobility services to residents who rely on safe, reliable transportation for healthcare, employment, and daily needs. The Healthcare Coalition invested nearly \$200,000 in lifesaving equipment for hospitals and long-term care facilities, ensuring our healthcare system is better prepared for emergencies. We also continued our valuable work in public safety and emergency management, from hazardous materials training to large-scale hurricane exercises that improve local and regional preparedness.

These accomplishments reflect the heart of who we are as a Council: fostering community engagement in future growth and development, promoting regional economic growth, and supporting our local governments in preserving and celebrating the unique character of Northeast Florida. Through innovative planning, strategic partnerships, and community outreach, we are building a stronger, safer, and more resilient region.

## **Transportation Disadvantaged Program** *Ensuring Mobility Resources Since 1989*





#### **Who does the Transportation Disadvantaged** (TD) Program serve?

This program serves individuals with physical or mental disabilities, older adults, people with limited incomes, and children handicapped, high-risk, or at-risk. For these individuals, access to healthcare, employment, education, shopping, and social activities often depends on reliable transportation.

#### **How are the services provided?**

The TD Program provides that lifeline through a coordinated, statewide effort that groups riders together for shared-ride services. Transportation services are available in all 67 Florida counties, with the Northeast Florida Regional Council (NEFRC) proudly serving the seven counties of Northeast Florida.

#### **How is the program funded and managed?**

The Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged oversees the statewide coordination of TD services through a seven-member, governor-appointed board and eight ex-officio members representing key purchasing agencies. Together, they set policies, approve the designation of every Community Transportation Coordinator (CTC) at least once every five years, administer the TD Trust Fund, and review and approve Commission publications, among other responsibilities.

#### What is the Northeast Florida Regional Council's role in the program?

Locally, the NEFRC has served as the official planning agency for Baker, Clay, Flagler, Nassau, Putnam, and St. Johns counties since 1984, and for Duval County since 2001. In this role, the Council assists CTCs and Local Coordinating Boards in implementing TD programs, provides staffing support for the Local Coordinating Board, procures and recommends CTCs, and leads transportation planning activities for the service area. The Local Coordinating Boards meet quarterly to provide oversight and guidance on the coordination of services, while the contracted CTCs deliver transportation directly to TD customers. For more than three decades, the NEFRC has worked alongside local partners to ensure that essential transportation is available to the Region's most vulnerable residents. We look forward to continuing this service and strengthening mobility across Northeast Florida.



# Economic Development Program

For many years, the Northeast Florida Regional Council (NEFRC) has proudly served as the designated Economic Development District for the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA). In this role, the Council advances a broad range of economic development priorities that strengthen communities and promote long-term prosperity. These efforts include providing technical assistance for federal grant applications, supporting community visioning efforts, and utilizing advanced economic modeling tools, such as REMI PI+, to assist local governments with data-driven decision-making.

## **Community Visioning Program**



This year, the Council launched its Community Visioning Program, a cornerstone of our economic development work. Visioning plays a vital role in shaping a community's future by building consensus around shared goals and aspirations. By bringing together residents, governments, and stakeholders, the program helps identify local priorities, uncover opportunities, and address challenges. The Community Visioning Program will focus on the Region's smaller communities that lack the resources to conduct visioning work.

This program will enhance the community's ability to plan for and incorporate long-term recovery and resiliency. The result is a clear roadmap that guides sustainable development and enhances the quality of life for all who call Northeast Florida home. This September the program will kickoff with participation from the City of Bunnell and the City of Palm Coast.



#### SHRIMPING INDUSTRY MARKET STUDY

The Northeast Florida Regional Council (NEFRC), with grant funding from the Florida Department of Commerce, led a Shrimping Industry Market Study across Duval, Nassau, Flagler, and St. Johns Counties. Guided by seven community meetings and direct input from local shrimpers, the study examined ways to support small businesses, enhance the regional food economy, and preserve this iconic coastal industry. The recommendations included forming a regional shrimping cooperative, establishing a strong local brand, partnering with workforce development programs, and enhancing public outreach efforts. With the

study complete, NEFRC is now working alongside shrimping stakeholders to implement these recommendations, ensuring a resilient and sustainable future for Northeast Florida's shrimping tradition.






### **ECONOMIC IMPACT ANALYSIS WITH REMI**

The Northeast Florida Regional Council uses REMI, an advanced economic forecasting and policy analysis software, to project the impact of business development on employment, GDP growth, and population.

This year, staff completed a REMI analysis for the Thrasher-Horne Center, highlighting its outsized role in Clay County's economy as a national destination for dance competitions that attract visitors from outside the Region. NEFRC also updated its REMI analysis for Project Niagara, a bottling plant in Clay County, using actual job and salary data to model the impact of its recent expansion. Additionally, a REMI analysis was conducted for Duval County's Project Link, a facility to build small autonomous transit vehicles, providing insight into the potential regional economic benefits of this emerging industry.

These analyses enable local leaders to understand how projects contribute to regional prosperity and inform data-driven economic development decisions.





## Flagler County Medical Countermeasures Point-Of-Dispensing Exercise



The exercise practitioners at the NEFRC discussion-based implemented operation-based POD exercise for the Florida Department of Health in Flagler County. The goal of the exercise series was to enhance and validate the Department of Health, Flagler County's Strategic National Stockpile, Mass Prophylaxis and Immunization Plan (POD Plan). Routine testing through exercising of the POD Plan is a requirement of the State of Florida. discussion-based exercise procedural review of the policies and actions taken by DOH-Flagler County to activate and implement its POD Plan.

This includes coordinating with vital community partners/agencies to establish, support, and demobilize Point of Dispensing operations. The operations-based exercise was developed to provide just-in-time training to health department staff and support agencies on their expected roles and responsibilities to implement a POD in the community. The primary focus was on POD setup, operations, and demobilization, including collaboration with key community partners and agencies.

### St. Johns County – Annual Hurricane Exercise

On May 29th, St. Johns County Emergency Management conducted its annual hurricane exercise, which brought together over 200 partners to address the hypothetical "Hurricane Waterloo," characterized by 100 mph winds, over 15 inches of rain, severe flooding, and critical road and bridge impacts. Activation staff had the opportunity to validate their WebEOC, a web-based platform for managing emergency operations, using a fictional hurricane scenario.

Participants from dozens of partners, including local governments, county and local agencies, emergency responders, nonprofits, and utilities, tested their capabilities to disseminate information, manage response missions, and validate financial plans. An After-Action Report and Improvement Plan was developed to help highlight strengths and opportunities for improvement.





## JEA & City of Jacksonville: Annual Hurricane Drill



The 2025 JEA-COJ Hurricane Exercise was a threeday functional exercise with JEA's Leadership and Section Chiefs, the City of Jacksonville's Emergency Preparedness Division, and the Florida Division of Emergency Management. Due to multiple annual hurricane exercises and recent real-world activations, the emergency management program and exercise planning team decided to stress further and test JEA's preparedness, response, and recovery capabilities. The scale and magnitude of the hurricane resulted in significant regional-level impacts, with severe consequences at the local level. This further challenged the availability of resources, communications, and mutual agreements.














## **Healthcare Coalition Program**



The Healthcare Coalition Program (HCC) is a federal initiative bringing together all healthcare sectors to plan, train, exercise, and equip in advance of disasters and emergencies. Comprised of 10 funded HCC regions, the Florida Department of Health contracts with the NEFRC to manage three 501(c)3 healthcare coalitions that serve 18 counties. Known as the Alliance, coalition membership includes 945 individuals (from 578 organizations, agencies, and facilities) across 11 business sectors.





Each year, the Alliance and its Board of Directors review mitigation strategies to fund projects that will increase the capacity, capability, and resilience of the regional healthcare system. This past fiscal year, funding was allocated to purchase evacuation equipment for long-term care facilities and disaster stretchers for hospital medical surge.

These resources make a measurable impact. Evacuation sleds and stair chairs allow residents in long-term care facilities to be moved quickly and safely during emergencies, reducing risks for both patients and staff. Disaster stretchers expand hospital surge capacity, providing mobile, easily deployable beds that can be used during mass casualty incidents, alternate care site activations, or other emergencies that overwhelm traditional hospital resources.

Through strategic investment in regional projects, training, and exercise, the Alliance is closing gaps in regional preparedness and easing the burden on healthcare providers. Together, we are building a stronger, safer, and more resilient regional healthcare system.





## **LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEE**





The Northeast Florida Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) is one of ten regional committees across the State, serving as a vital link between hazardous materials facilities, first responders, and the community. Appointed by the State Emergency Response Commission, the LEPC brings together hazmat professionals and engaged citizens with one shared mission: to strengthen chemical safety and emergency preparedness in our region.

The Committee's work centers on accident prevention, response readiness, and compliance with hazardous materials reporting laws. Under the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act of 1986 (EPCRA), facilities that use, produce, or store hazardous substances must file annual reports detailing their chemical inventories. The Northeast Florida Regional Council serves as the public repository for this information, ensuring transparency and supporting regional planning.

Using these reports, the LEPC develops and updates local and regional hazardous materials emergency response plans. These plans guide first responders during a chemical emergency and are regularly refined as new facilities come into compliance or as inventories change. Through this ongoing effort, the LEPC enhances community safety and strengthens the Region's ability to respond effectively to hazardous materials incidents.

#### HANDS-ON RAIL TRAINING STRENGTHENS HAZMAT RESPONSE



In February 2025, the Northeast Florida Regional Council (NEFRC), through its Local Emergency Planning Committee (NEFL LEPC), partnered with CSX and regional hazmat teams to host a weeklong hands-on rail training. The program brought together first responders from Clay County, Jacksonville, and St. Johns County to enhance preparedness for rail-related hazardous materials incidents. Using CSX's Responder Incident Training Train, participants gained practical experience with rail safety, leak control, and hazardous materials handling.

Hazmat Technicians completed advanced coursework, while awareness-level training was offered for non-hazmat responders. Hands-on work with multiple railcar types, including DOT 105, 111, 112, and 117, and a CSX Training Locomotive provided critical skills in fire suppression, spill management, and equipment safety.

By blending collaboration with real-world practice, the training strengthened responder capabilities and reinforced Northeast Florida's collective readiness to safeguard communities against hazardous materials emergencies.

## OPERATION FROZEN SUMMER: STRENGTHENING SAFETY THROUGH SIMULATION




On August 22, 2025, the Northeast Florida Regional Council (NEFRC) hosted Operation Frozen Summer, a multi-agency tabletop exercise in Jacksonville focused on improving preparedness for hazardous materials incidents at cold storage facilities. The discussion-based exercise

engaged partners from Sysco International Foods, Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department (JFRD), and its hazmat teams, along with environmental response agencies.

Participants worked through a progressively complex scenario, starting with an internal facility issue and escalating to a coordinated, multi-agency response that required protective actions for the surrounding community. The exercise emphasized critical objectives such as establishing unified command, strengthening communication and notification systems, and developing strategies to safeguard both employees and residents. Interactive mapping further enhanced the experience, enabling agencies to visualize protective zones, staging areas, and the impact on communities.

By providing a no-fault, collaborative environment, Operation Frozen Summer reinforced the strength of Jacksonville's emergency response network and advanced the Region's readiness to manage complex hazmat events.







## **RESILIENT FIRST COAST**


Resilient First Coast (RFC) is Northeast Florida's regional resilience collaborative, led by the Northeast Florida Regional Council. Launched in 2022, the Collaborative brings together local governments, businesses, non-profits, academic partners, and state and federal agencies with a shared goal: to strengthen the Region's ability to adapt to climate change and future hazards.

#### **LOCAL RESILIENCY PROJECTS**

The NEFRC is nearing completion of major resiliency projects in Flagler and Baker Counties. In Flagler, the Council has worked over several years to develop a comprehensive understanding of flood risk, starting with a vulnerability assessment, progressing to a compound flooding analysis, and culminating this year in an adaptation plan. Together, these efforts identify flooding hazards, model their combined impacts, and provide strategies for reducing risk, while fostering

coordination among municipalities across the County. In Baker County, the vulnerability assessment focused on rainfall-driven flooding, while also for tidal evaluating the potential inundation and storm surge along the St. Marys River. The project also explores green roadway solutions in identified offering problem areas, innovative options to manage stormwater and reduce future impacts.

#### **REGIONAL RESILIENCE ACTION PLAN**



The Regional Resilience Action Plan (RRAP) was developed by NEFRC and Resilient First Coast (RFC). Phase I of the RRAP, which outlined and described goals, objectives, and best practices, was completed in the previous fiscal year and recognized with an Impact Award from the National Association of Development Organizations. Phase II, which focuses on specific actions and sub-actions distilled from the concepts in Phase I, was completed this fiscal year. The new RRAP begins by defining a clear vision statement, as well as goals and objectives related to enhancing regional resilience. Context is provided on Northeast Florida and various shocks and stressors facing the Region today, including flooding, heat, and hurricanes.

It then describes various actions that NEFRC and RFC can take to improve regional resilience. The regional approach will advance resilience far beyond what could be accomplished by local governments working alone. This document outlines ways in which NEFRC and RFC can facilitate cooperation to find effective solutions to regional challenges, provide resources and guidance to advance work happening at the local level, and analyze and synthesize regionally significant data to help inform decision-making.



# MILITARY INSTALLATION READINESS REVIEW

The Military Installation Readiness Review (MIRR) is a region-wide effort led by the Northeast Florida Regional Council in partnership with Jacobs to identify risks, hazards, and vulnerabilities that affect the ability of local military installations to carry out their missions. Unlike traditional base planning, the MIRR looks "outside the fence line," focusing on how community infrastructure, land use, and environmental factors impact mission assurance. Since its launch in April 2025, the project has brought together military leaders, elected officials, planners, engineers, and community stakeholders to address shared challenges such as flooding, traffic congestion, shoreline erosion, encroachment, and utility reliability.




To date, the MIRR team has completed installation tours and stakeholder workshops at Marine Corps Support Facility Blount Island, Naval Station Mayport, Camp Blanding Joint Training Center, and Naval Air Station Jacksonville. These sessions have highlighted critical needs, from backup water supply, encroachment concerns to stormwater compliance, road and rail corridor resilience, and fire and emergency response capacity; while also surfacing opportunities for collaboration.





The MIRR will continue assessing vulnerabilities, mapping risks, and developing a prioritized list of projects that can strengthen both military readiness and community resilience. By uniting regional partners around shared goals, the project is ensuring that Northeast Florida's installations remain secure, its communities prepared, and its role in national defense protected for the future.







## **Regional Community Institute**

The Regional Community Institute (RCI) was established in 2005, in response to a growing recognition that Northeast Florida needed a broad-based organization dedicated to advancing and promoting regionalism. Its mission is to enhance the quality of the Region's natural, built, economic, and social environments. RCI is organized exclusively for charitable and educational purposes and is housed within the Northeast Florida Regional Council. Its members consist of graduates of the Regional Leadership Academy.



## **Regional Leadership Academy**

The Regional Leadership Academy is a program of the NEFRC dedicated to fostering a commitment to regionalism and empowering future leaders to shape the Region's success. Since its start in 2006, the academy has graduated over 330 local leaders. Through an immersive eight-month program covering each county in the Northeast Region, this experience prepares graduates to actively drive regional collaboration.

## Trails & Eco-Tourism Initiative

In 2024, the Council launched a regional initiative to expand trail access and promote outdoor recreation across Northeast Florida. Seven trail itinerary workshops were held in seven counties, where participants designed draft itineraries for hikers, paddlers, residents, and visitors; complete with details on parking, restrooms, restaurants, and camping.

The Council also shared its regional trail work at the Bartram Trail National Conference in St. Augustine and partnered with the National Park Service (NPS) Rivers, Trails, and Conservation Assistance Program to support Baker County in developing a water trail along the St. Marys River. This included site visits to Shoals Park and a design charrette to explore river access improvements, with NPS now developing a conceptual plan for both Shoals Park and the St. Mary's paddling trail.

Looking ahead, the Council is advancing a Youth Stewardship Program and a Trail Signage Guide, both set to be completed by year's end, further enhancing access, connectivity, and appreciation of our region's natural assets.








## **NEFRC Substance Use Disorder Initiative**




Over the last 2 years, staff has completed a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats (SWOT) analysis specific to substance use disorders for each county in the Region. Putnam and Flagler counties were completed this year. The Council is currently focused on completing a comprehensive report that will aggregate findings regionally.

This interconnected approach ensures that all seven counties in Northeast Florida benefit from shared knowledge, best practices, and coordinated efforts to combat the opioid crisis and improve public health outcomes.


