Meeting Summary

The Northeast Florida Regional Council convened the Military Installation Readiness Review Technical Advisory Committee Meeting on Thursday January 22nd, to review and discuss the MIRR vulnerability assessment methodology and walk through preliminary results of the analysis.

Technical Advisory Committee members provided targeted feedback focused on data corrections, infrastructure stressors and additional information needed to refine analysis.

TAC members emphasized the need for a few minor data clarifications and corrections within the current analysis. These included revisiting the police station's storm surge exposure, confirming that State Road 16 is a state facility, and correcting the location of Roosevelt Blvd relative to NAS Jacksonville. Installation representatives also highlighted important infrastructure stressors: Camp Blanding noted that aging rail infrastructure and maintenance gaps pose greater challenges than environmental hazards; NS Mayport raised concerns regarding vulnerable shoreline-adjacent roads and potential opportunities such as a flyover bridge concept; and NAS Jacksonville identified persistent congestion issues around the Buckman Bridge and Roosevelt/295 interchange. Blount Island representatives drew attention to a critical data gap concerning AT&T fiber lines, underscoring the installation's single point of failure for communications redundancy. Additionally, development pressures and encroachment were reinforced as ongoing challenges for both Camp Blanding and NOLF Whitehouse.

Each installation also provided initial feedback on the preliminary results. TAC members from NAS Jacksonville acknowledged the analysis with overall approval. Representatives from Blount Island Command indicated that the preliminary outputs look good. NS Mayport confirmed that the assessment effectively captured their primary concerns while noting they would benefit from additional time to review the detailed findings. Camp Blanding expressed satisfaction noting the need for refinements addressing railhead vulnerabilities and the inclusion of the additional ACUB layer.

The meeting concluded with a discussion of next steps including continuing participation in the Mutual Support Agreement task of the project as well as preparing for adaptation strategy development. Stakeholders agreed to provide several key datasets needed to refine the vulnerability assessment, including the ACUB buffer data from Camp Blanding, REPI layers, and protected lands information from North Florida Land Trust. The project team will incorporate multiple corrections into the analysis, such as updates to stormwater permit ownership details and roadway designations. Follow-up is also required for the AT&T fiber redundancy issue at Blount Island, with maps still pending from installation representatives coordinating with AT&T. In addition, NEFRC will resend all relevant briefing materials to the TAC following the meeting.

Next Step Action Items:

- Begin framing adaptation strategies, including both policy and infrastructure mitigation projects.
- Jacobs to follow up with installation representatives for additional data layers (ACUB, REPI layers, AT&T fiber maps) to help inform adaptation planning.
- Continued cooperation between installations, municipalities, NEFRC, and Jacobs team partners on Mutual Support Agreements
- Preparation underway for the May 2026 emergency management exercise.
